

In her service and loyalty to the Mooreland/Messick community, Janet Brown Modjeski has continued in the tradition of her parents, Norman and Marjorie Brown, and both sets of grandparents, Webb and Cecile Black and Everett and Nellie Brown, all well-known residents of Blue River Township.
