## TOM KOONTZ — MAKING A HARD JOB EASY

Some of the jobs that make the Mooreland Fair go are hard, and some are easy. One of the secrets of the Fair's success is the behind-the-scenes work that has been refined into a routine by veteran members of the Fair Board like Tom Koontz.

Tom Koontz can't remember exactly how long he has been "selling spaces" to exhibitors at the Fair, but he does remember that, in the beginning, "It wasn't easy. We would drive the country over to fill the place. . . . Sometimes we didn't fill it." Tom worked with Sandy Manifold in those days, but for several years has worked alone, except that his wife, Mary Lou, "takes a lot of phone calls and, when we had the tent, she and the kids (Jack, Don, and Lisa) helped mark off the spaces."

Now that the "big tent" is a permanent building, the spaces don't move from year to year, so that part of Tom's job is easier. Also easier is the selling. Of the 48 spaces in the front (the "big tent") and the 12 spaces in the back (the "antique tent," now also a building) all are already sold. "If somebody wants two spaces, we have to say 'No."

There have been some other changes through the years. Tom remembers when almost all of the booths were used for display by established businesses, but "now maybe 3/4 sell something right there. People can sell who don't necessarily have a store." Some, Mary Lou adds, "might work all year getting ready."

Changes are gradual, though, because turnover is low — 7 or 8 spaces a year. That, too, makes Tom 's job easier, as does the lack of red tape in the selling process. As Tom says, "If they say they'll 'come and I say they have a space--that's a contract." If they don't show up and don't pay, "they don't come to the Mooreland Fair again. " If they don 't come, there is always someone waiting for their space.

The merchants are selling lots of things — home improvement, photography, crafts, violets. What the Fair is selling the sellers, Tom says, is people: "When they see lots of people walking by, they 're happy." And his job, Tom says, is "a lot more fun when people are happy."

Tom and Mary Lou Koontz have spent a great portion of their "nonworking" hours in service to organizations in the Mooreland community, and especially to South Christian Church. Tom has spent his "working" hours at Warner Gear in Muncie, where he retired May 31 after 44 years. Mary Lou will retire this year from the Mooreland bank so that she and Tom can have more leisure time to visit with their children and grandchildren. But Tom has as yet announced no plans to retire from his "easy" job on the Mooreland Fair Board —" just trying to fill the spaces and make people happy."
