Before the contest begins, it's not uncommon to see Madonna working with a youngster on the piano, trying to get a song just right. Her love of music - which led her to learn to play the piano and sing in the church choir as a youth - is eagerly shared with contestants from age 5 to 75 who want to make a good showing.

And in the weeks leading up to the contest, Madonna is the primary person fielding entries and getting background information on the contestants.

As a result of her efforts, the Mooreland Talent Contest annually draws entrants not just from Henry County, but throughout the East Central Indiana area.

"Madonna is very good at carrying things out," Mrs. Brown said.
