and countless miles touring all 48 contiguous states, four men will soon bring their talents to Mooreland, Indiana, as Flynnville Train.

This group from East Central Indiana is on track to perform their good-time, rockin' country music Saturday, Aug. 15 at the Mooreland Free Fair.

Flynnville Train members are Brian Flynn (lead vocals), Brent Flynn (lead guitar, vocals), Tim Beeler (bass, vocals), and Tommy Bales (drums).

They've worked in factories, raised families, and obsessed over perfecting their craft. They supported each other's efforts for years before collaborating in 2001. All four men bring vastly different influences on-board, from George Jones to Jimi Hendrix, and all share writing credits on the group's latest album.

Playing a blend of heartland country and revved-up twin-guitar rock, the band draws fans with its rebel energy and real-life country songs. The group is dedicated to staying true to their kind of country. While critics hear the influence of everyone from Lynyrd Skynyrd to the Headhunters and Hank, Sr., for the boys in the band it's just country music, Flynnville Train style.

When not performing fan favorites like "High on the Mountain," Flynnville Train travels from Indiana to the hills of Kentucky, where they spend many hours writing and recording. They have recorded multiple CDs, both self-released and under the Show Dog Nashville label established by Toby Keith. The group has toured with Keith and garnered air time on his "Broken Bridges" movie soundtrack. They have also opened for Marty Stuart.

With members from Middletown, Upland and Fort Wayne, Flynnville Train is often described as one of the nicest groups in the industry whose high-powered performances keep crowds as well as venue owners asking for more.

The group is to arrive in town leading the fair parade, Saturday, Aug. 15 at 3 p.m. Their performance is slated to begin that evening at 9 p.m.

The Johnsons – a new generation

\ \ \ \ \ hen people around Mooreland think of what a Mooreland Fair Board member would be like, they might generally think of someone from the older generation. But, in fact, there are not very many of the old-line members left. And quite a number of the very active and experienced members of the board are in their 40s or younger. Kenny and Andrea Johnson are just two examples of this new generation of fair board members.

Kenny and Andrea live in the country east of Mooreland, but they are not farmers. Kenny has his own business, Mooreland Wireless Internet, which is headquartered in the former piano string factory office on Broad Street in Mooreland. Wireless service, he says, is especially useful in rural areas, for "the last mile." Depending on whether school is in session or not, he also

has another full-time job, "stay-athome dad," he calls it, taking care of 9-year-old son, Craig, while Andrea works at St. Gobain Container Corporation in Muncie, negotiating production and deliveries for business clients.

Although most of Kenny's work on the fair board has been in the last five years, he joined the board in 1988-89, not long after his 1987 graduation from Blue River Valley High School. Like many other Mooreland natives, he grew up with the fair. He remembers first helping Don Linville and Don's son, Brad, work on the pulling track. In 2004, Kenny says, Eric Miller came to him with a need for someone to take charge of track events. Kennard Landreth, who will now be back running the track set-up again this year, had health issues. So, for the past few years, Kenny has been responsible for the events, with the exception of horse pulls. He also helps put some weights on the sleds for those pulls.

As Kenny says, the track is a lot of work, and many people have shared in that work. Todd Brown does a lot of preparation and "takes care of the bleachers." Jeff Murray is another helper. Andrea says she helps "on the other side of the track." Kenny's sisters, Wendy and Shannon, help there, too. Some of the same people come to help every year; there's a man who takes care of the gate and Paul Gillock, who does the announcing. Gillock's step-dad, Don Wright, used to do it when Don Linville was in charge.

Scheduling the events has changed a lot in the past few years. Kenny

specific pulling organizations, and there is a lot of money involved. It is expensive for the pullers, using specially-built tractors, and they expect the prize money to be worth their while. Usually only two nights of the fair require membership in specific sanctioning bodies "but those are the big nights."

Andrea first started working at the fair helping Betty Linville in the parade field. Andrea's dad used to help in the field and Kenny did too. Andrea came on the board in 2002 and is now in her fourth year as treasurer. The fair is not a moneymaking business, but there are surprisingly large amounts of money coming in and going out. As Andrea says, "thank goodness for the girls at First Merchants Bank." When the fair is going on, Andrea is always available, usually out on the other side of the track. If she is not there, she might be in a ticket booth, the ham and bean tent, or the hog dog stand.

Kenny is also a member of the Mooreland Volunteer Fire Department and Andrea is active working with the firemen's wives. Some of them are special friends who became close working together in fundraisers and building floats for the kiddie parade and Saturday parade. Whether the fire department specifically has a float or not, Andrea expects to help build a float with other families like Jeff and Lucy Murray and Todd and Mysia Brown. Units she helped with were winners in several past parades. Andrea was chairman of the children's parade for awhile (now Brian and Nikki Koontz are in charge). She encourages more

One of her other hobbies is scrapbooking. She thinks it is as strong as ever, but like everything else, has changed, "gone digital."

Kenny's major hobby is flying model aircraft. He is a member of the Wright Flyers. Kenny recently participated at an event in Dayton.

Besides working for the fair, and revamping the fair's website, which she plans to update each night during the week, Andrea, is helping plan her 20th high school reunion.

Her regular routine after work includes coming into Mooreland and walking with Lucy Murray. She says they are in training leading up to the high point, the Mooreland Free Fair 5K Run!

Andrea is especially excited about the Saturday appearance of the band, Flynnville Train, which is something different for the fair. Besides new entertainment, there will also be new food, like deep-fried Twinkies and some Blizzard-like Mooreland Fair concoctions.

When asked how the fair could be improved, Kenny and Andrea suggest more local people get involved. Friends and family have been a big help to her and Kenny, Andrea says, helping watch Craig and being supportive. Volunteer for something, Andrea says, even an hour working in the food building would be appreciated. Everyone can do it, and no offer will ever be turned down. Get a friend and get involved.
